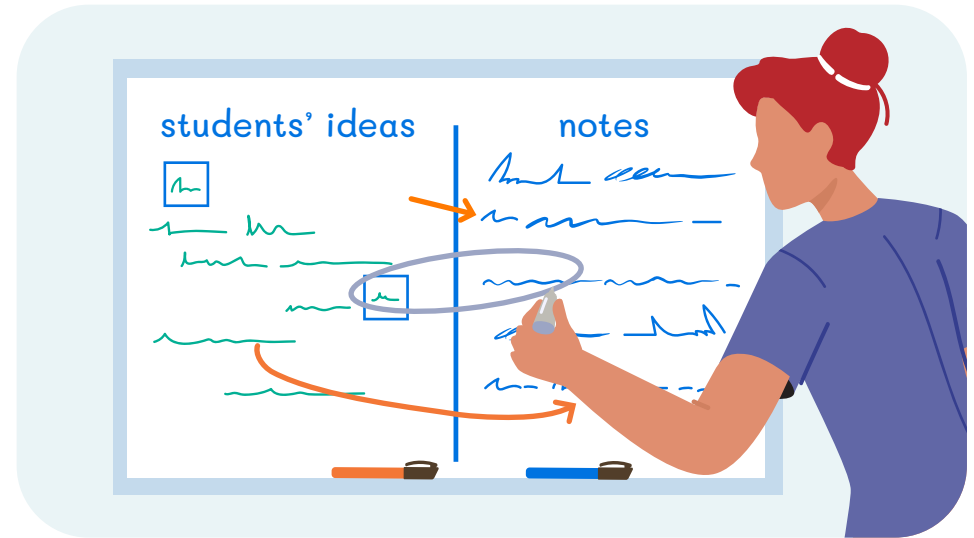
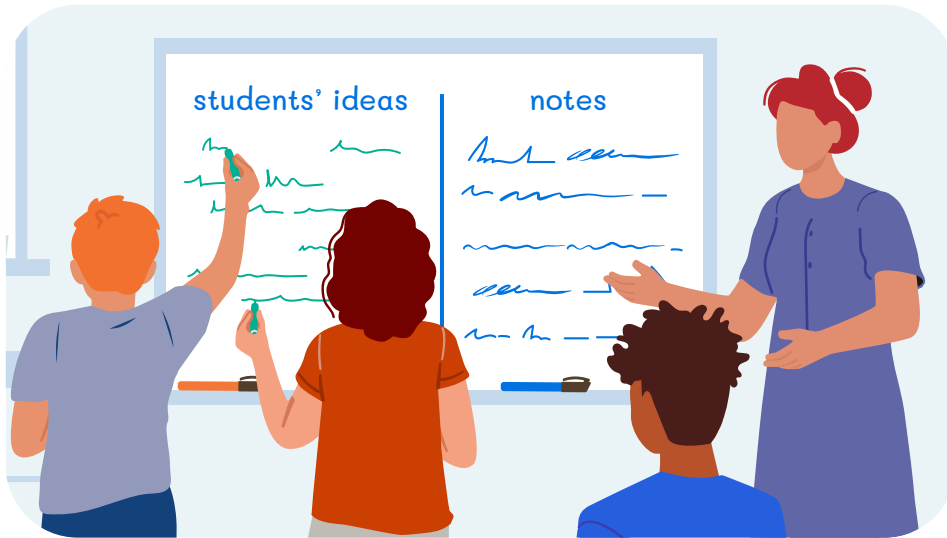


# Students On Board

Integrate student ideas directly into your lesson space.

Plan to include student work on your main board. As you write and explain other parts of the lesson, make connections to the displayed student work.



## Why Try It



*This nudge increases engagement by **elevating student work** to the main board and connecting their ideas to key lesson concepts. Research also highlights the benefits of placing items side-by-side within the same visual field, rather than on a side or back board.*

## MLR 2: Collect and Display

Displaying students' ideas publicly makes their thinking accessible to the class. By putting a student's work up near the main instructional space, teachers can highlight strategies and concepts in pursuit of the goals for the lesson.

### Teacher Notes

- Display students' work or ideas in detail, not just answers.
- You might have students write their work on the board, or write it yourself based on their description to organize or rephrase it.
- Try to vary which students' work you include on the board over time.



### Caution

Do not clutter the board with too much work.
